. "It sounds funny, I know." Said Phil Wyatt of rural Hutchinson, "But it looked bell-shaped and had green and red lights that blinked. I saw it. I know it happened."

The Hutchonian thus added his report to the vast list of UFO (Unidentified Flying Object) sightings reported Sunday night in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Kansas. Authorities in all four states were deluged with reports.

Gazing into the inky blackness of the Sunday night sky over Hutchinson, Wyatt, of 6280 North Monroe, said he spotted the mysterious flying objects about midnight, and studied them with binoculars. His account was confirmed by six others, most of them members of his family, who watched with him for over two hours, and by at least 10 other persons who called *The News* Sunday night.

"It just hovered above for quite a while in the north sky. It looked like it was over between Inman and McPherson," Wyatt said. Through the field glasses, he said, "It looked bell-shaped. It gave off red and green lights. But the white light was the brightest. It seemed to generate its own light."

Wyatt, operator of Nelson Music Co., 509 North Main, said the object was brighter than the brightest stars. He said the UFO moved quickly and noiselessly. The Hutchonian, who is also a pilot, estimated its elevation at 5,000 to 10,000 feet.

Wyatt said he heard of the sightings from a report over an Oklahoma radio station. "We decided we'd go out and look. I've never seen anything like it before."

On Oklahoma Radio

The Oklahoma Highway Patrol said Tinker Air Force Base here was tracking as many as four of the Unidentified flying objects on its radar screen at one time, estimating their altitude at about 22,000 feet.

A Tinker spokesman refused at confirm or deny the radar observations.

The Oklahoma Highway Patrol said police officers in three different patrol cars reported watching the objects flying a diamond-shaped formation for about 30 minutes in the Shawnee area. The patrol said the officers described the objects as changing in color from red to white to blue-green.

TOPEKA (AP) – Gov. William H. Avery made a tongue in cheek observation Monday that reports of Unidentified Flying Object sightings in South Central Kansas Sunday night were merely the aftermath of the annual convention of Kansas American Legion members at Wichita.

The three-day convention ended Sunday, with election of Don Janssen of Holyrood as state commander.

Descriptions telephoned to police and other authorities included:

"They were red and exploded in a shower of sparks and at other times fluttered like a leaf in the clear sky.

Deputy Sheriff Dan Carter of Canyon, Tex., said he "thought at first a plane had exploded in the air." The object "appeared to go south," he said, "then disintegrated in all colors."

At Caldwell, south of Wichita, two rookie policemen said the lights they saw in the sky over southern Kansas made them believers in unidentified flying objects.

Officer Dave Lowe, 21, said they got within perhaps 50 yards of one of the lights.

"It didn't look at all like what I thought a flying saucer would," he said. "It wasn't round and it was much longer than it was wide.

"Actually it looked like an egg. It was a hundred yards long."

Lowe and officer Eddie Roberts, 24, said they raced after the light in a patrol car for a closer look. As they pulled onto U.S. 81 the object disappeared behind a hedge row, Lowe said.

"When it went behind the hedge row, the darn thing must have turned out the lights so we wouldn't follow it," he added. "Any way we never saw the thing again."

Radar Scope Blips Still A Mystery

WICHITA (AP) – "We don't know what caused the blips on the radar but something was there," meteorologist Ellis Pike of the Weather Bureau said today.

Persons over a wide area of the Southwest Sunday night deluges law enforcement offices with reports of apparently unidentified flying objects.

Pike said the blips on the bureau's radar screen at Municipal Airport began about 2:30 am. and continued intermittently until after 6 a.m.

"At one time I think they counted as many as four blips on the radar scope at one time," Pike said.

"For what it's worth," he added, "we just a few minutes ago counted 14 planes in the air and the immediate area of the sightings. Most of the sightings were in the vicinity of Wellington, Kan., about 30 miles south of here."

Pike didn't know how many of the planes contained sightseers who had gone up early today in hopes of getting a closer look at whatever was in the sky.

He said the altitude of the blips ranged from about 5,000 to over 20,000 feet.

Because of the size of the radar screen, he added, there was no indication of the size of whatever caused the blips.

At lease four Wellington citizens told today of seeing colored glows in the southern Kansas sky during the early morning hours.

The Wellington <u>Daily News</u> said it received calls from several other persons who apparently came from unidentified flying objects.
