Incident #112, a-f -- Ashley and Delaware, Ohio -- 8 April 1948 (Supercedes interim report of 2/15/49)

From the descriptions given by the various observers -notably that the object soon appeared like a clearly-outlined cloud, was fleecy white, moved slowly and maintained snape, was a long vertical oylinder -- one can surmise that there is a strong possibility that the object was nothing hore than a short, vertical, daytime noteor trail, These trails are known to persist for half an hour or more, and to drift with prevailing winds aloft. The fact that one observer stated that at first the cylinder resempled sky writing is excellent corroboration for the above explanation.

Report of Findings:

(1) On 12 April 1948, Mrs. H. S. Kirkpatrick, housewife, 107 North
Washington Street, Deleware, Ohio was interviewed concerning an unidentified
object in the sky, and stated in substance:

On Thursday afternoon 8 April 1948, at approximately 2:30PM, I was in my backyard when I heard an airplane. I did not see any plane but I netiesd a posulier abject in the sky. This object was somewhat spherical in shape but seemed larger at the top with a protruding end undermeath. It looked white, about the color of a fleecy cloud, but it was clearly outlined, and maintained the same shape as it moved along. The weather, was clear, the sky was blue, the sun was shining, and there were no clouds near the object. The most peculiar thing to me was that the wind was blowing from the West and the object was moving in a southwesterly direction against the wind. The object moved steadily along, not too fast, and seemed to maintain the same altitude. It did not maneuver in any way, and I did not see any exhaust trail. I did not hear any sound from it. I cannot estimate the size or altitude of this object as I did not have anything to compare it with and it kept noving away from me. However, I do not believe it was large enough for a person to be inside. I called my son, Robert Coohran, who is in the Merchant Marine and was home for a visit, and he said he thought the object was very unusual. He said it was the shape of a rainspout but he did not know what it was. I went next door and called our nieghbors, Reverend and Mrs. John Bergen, and they came out to see it. I do not have any idea what it was.

interviewed and stated in substance:

On Thursday, S April 1948, at approximately 2:50PM, Mrs. Kirkpatrick, our next door neighbor, came to the door and told us to come out and see the strange phenomenon in the sky. We went into the backyard and saw this strange object in the sky, a little south of west from our house. There was only one object and main part seemed to be spherical with a small protrusion above it, like vapor streaks. It was very white and looked like a concentrated bit of cloud except it was clearly outlined. The weather was olear, the sun was shining, and there were no clouds near the object although there was a bank of elouds to the south of us at quite a distance. I would judge the object was up several thousand feet but I cannot be sure because I could not tell whether it was above or below cloud level. I also could not determine its size as I could not tell whether it was a small object near us or a large object for away, as I had nothing to compare it with. I would judge, however, that it could not have been less than 5 feet in width. The wind was blowing the trees and clouds from a westerly direction and the object was traveling away from us, not too fast, almost due west into the wind. It traveled in a straight line and did not maneuver. I could not hear any sound from it and I could not see any exhaust trail of any kind. We watched it for at least ten minutes until it disappeared from our view behind the trees.

(3) On 12 April 1968, Mrs. John H. Bergen, housewife, 111 North Washington Street, Delaware, Ohio was interviewed and substantiated all the facts as given by her husband in the above interview (par 2), and added the following:

The peculis object in the sky looked to me like a spherical "blob"
with streaks above it. By "blob" I mean like stiff batter or dough dropped
from a spoon. It was white and clearly outlined but it did not look like a
balloon. The sky around the object was completely clear of clouds. The
object was traveling against the wind in a southwesterly direction. I called
the Borkins Observatory three or four minutes after I first saw the object
and I talked to Nrs. Cruikshank, Dr. Bobobrownikov's secretary, and teld her
about it. We called back later but they had not been able to sight the object.
During the time I went into the house to telephone, the object did not seem to
change shape, nor did its altitude change. I heard planes flying over our
house at some time prior to the time Nrs. Kirkpatrick called us but I did not
see any planes. I do not know whether or not they had any connection with
the object.

(/i) On 12 April 1948, Reverend James B. Stephenson, Pastor of the First
Baptist Church, 98 North Franklin Street, Delaware, Ohio was interviewed and
stated in substance:

At approximately 2:30 PM on Thursday 5 April 1965, I heard a plane passing over our house. It seemed rather low and made a lot of noise but I did not go outside to look at it. Shortly after this I was called outside by my wife to see an unusual shape in the sky. My first reaction was that it was a plane on fire as it seemed to be an object surrounded by a vaporous substance. After studying it for a few seconds it became clearly outlined
