four bright lights were sighted at 8000' traveling approximately 400 mph. Observers chased the objects and passed them at 450 mph in a T-33 a/c. The a/c became low on fuel and landed at Traux Field.

### I. Description of Incident

Four bright lights in diamond formation were sighted at 1745 by a captain and a lieutenant flying in a T-33 aircraft located south of Madison, Wisconsin. The pilots followed until they overtook the objects and continued following them until low on fuel at which point they returned to their base. At no time was a silhouette visible, even against the lights of Milwaukee. Visibility was almost unlimited with a broken cloud deck at 25,000 feet. The observing aircraft was at an altitude of 5,000 feet.

### II. Discussion of Incident

Local radar was contacted to determine if they picked up the unidentified objects with negative results. The objects were traveling at a very high speed, excessive for weather balloons. The only possible explanation would center around aircraft in the area. To fit the speed of the object the aircraft would probably have to be in the jet category. There is no record of local or transient aircraft in the area. Furthermore, local radar was carrying the T-33 on its scope but had no return from the unidentified object. If the unknown was an aircraft it would have been evident on the scope.



- a. Did the T-33 eiroraft piloted by Capt W. D. Bridges and let Lt J. H. Johnson pass over, under, or around the four bright lights? At what estimated distance was the aircraft from the bright lights when it passed then?
  - b. What color sore the four bright lighte?
- e. Does the "contact" which you refer to in paragraph 2 between the 755th ACM Squadron and the T-33 sirerest refer to radio or radar contact? If the T-33 alreast was painted on the radar scope, was the image clear and distinct or was it fuzzy and blurred?
  - d. Did the four bright lights maintain the diamond formation constantly? Were the four bright lights always the same distance apart? Was there any apparent naneuvering or did they seem to fly straight and level at all times?
  - e. Did the 755th ACAN Squadrom attempt to pick up the unidentiflad flying objects even after the T-33 streraft broke visual contact? If so, for how long and what were the results?

- 1. With reference of your questions of letter dated 29, Dec. 1952, the following information is submitted.
- a. The T-33 aircraft piloted by Capt. W. D. Bridges and let Lt. J. E. Johnson first passed the objects on their right hand side, then crossing over to their left hand side, flying level along side the objects. Then the T-33 went low to go under and pass in front of the objects. An estimated speed of 450 mph was required to pass in front of the objects, and then the T-33 crossed back behind the objects and followed them.

The estimated distance when the T-33 passed the objects was 1000 ft.

- b. The color of the four lights was a very bright white.
- c. The 755th AC&W Squadron had both radio and rader contact with the T-33. 755th AC&W Squadron reported it could paint the T-33 clear on rader, but could not paint the objects.
- d. The four bright lights always remained the same distance apart in a diamond formation. Objects flew straight and level, but did turn from a Southeast heading to a East heading.
- e. On talking with the 755th AC&W Squadron this morning, they stated that they tried to contact the objects for twenty minutes, with negative results after the T-33 broke contact.

- 2. The two U. S. Air Force Technical Information Sheets have been completed with Capt. W. D. Bridges. At the present time 1st Lt. J. E. Johnson is TDY at Maxwell, Ala, attending the Squadron Officer's Course. I interrogated Lt. Johnson on 10 Dec. 1952, and his statements were identical with those of Capt. Bridges.
- 3. An article appeared in the Wisconsin State Journal of Madison, Wisconsin on the morning of 10 Dec. 1952, of the sighting of four bright lights moving in the sky by a farmer, a World War II pilot, in the same general area and approximately the same time as the sightings by Capt. Bridges and Lt. Johnson.


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Objects continued on a heading of 90° and pilots followed until low on fuel. At 17:550ST they broke away and landed at Truax Field at 18:00EST.


