Some "Crazy" Operations

The exchange of prisoners now underway at Panmunjom, Korea, is one of the most unusual operations in the history of modern warfare. In some respects, it is a weird maneuver.

While heavy artillery pounds away a short distance away, UN troops, held by the Reds, are released to walk across a line separating the enemy forces. This is at Panmunjom, where courtesy and efficiency are employed as weapons. There also must be a good bit of uneasiness in the atmosphere.

As the POW exchange takes place, Communist aircraft drop flares over Inchon port and Kimpo airfield, near Seoul. No bombs, just unexplained flares.

On the Korean western front, UN airmen reported seeing a small "white, rounded, delta shaped object" flying at about 60 to 80 miles an hour over Communist territory.

A U. S. officer spoke for all of us when he said: "The Communists sure have been acting crazy since this prisoner business started."

The exchange itself is a little peculiar, on the surface. About 605 Allied soldiers and marines will cross the line going one way, and some 5,800 Red fighters will go the other way.

And as the unusual takes place at the scene of warfare, the same old diplomatic goods are sold at the same old stands here and in Europe.

Airmen Report Strange Object

SEOUL (AP)—Three to five Communist planes circled over the big Allied West Coast port of Inchon and Kimpo Airfield, both near Seoul, Sunday night and dropped flares—but no bombs—on the eve of the exchange of disabled war prisoners.

U. S. airmen also reported seeing a strange "delta-shaped object" about seven feet in diameter flying at 60 to 80 miles an hour over Red lines on the Western Front.

"The Communists sure have been acting crazy ever since this prisoner business started," said an American frontline officer when informed of the Red air raid.

Aground, U. S. Third and Seventh Division troops and Belgian infantrymen hurled back a Red attack by 750 Chinese northwest of Kumbwa on the Central Front. The Reds struck behind a 20-minute artillery barrage.

The Eighth Army said 100 Chinese were killed or wounded in the 70 minute engagement.

Elsewhere along the front, contacts stepped up. South Korean raiders on the far eastern end of the 155-mile battle line killed or wounded 51 North Koreans south of Anchor Hill.

Reds also probed lightly at Outpost Texas, east of the Pukhan River and on Sniper Ridge on the

Central Front but were quickly scattered.

The Fifth Air Force said three to five slow moving enemy planes—probably the same "Red Check Charles" which harassed U. N. troops in 1951 and early 1952—dropped a number of flares on Inchon and Kimpo.

Only one or two enemy planes have been reported over Allied lines in recent months. Even when the Reds flew nightly missions they almost always went out singly.

There was no report of the planes dropping bombs. The Air Force said Allied night fighter planes were diverted to search for the enemy craft and that anti-aircraft guns were alerted.

Two trained aerial observers and two pilots flying routine reconnaissance missions in the Pork Chop-Old Baldy Hill sector of the Western Front reported to Army intelligence officers that they saw a "white, rounded, delta-shaped object" five to seven feet in diameter flying with a vibrating motion just north of the two hills.

The Communists attacked Pork Chop Hill both Thursday and Friday nights but were beaten back both times.

Intelligence officers did not evaluate the report.

Elsewhere along the front, snipers stopped up. South Korean raiders on the Far Eastern end of

the 135-mile battle line killed or wounded 51 North Koreans south of Anchor Hill.

Reds also probed lightly at Outpost Texas, east of the Pukhan River and on Sniper Ridge on the Central Front but were quickly scattered.

What outer space notable throws out the first flying saucer to open the season for those here on Earth?

We may never know, but the evidence is incontrovertible that the season is with us again. Recently, the wire services carried a story about a "delta-shaped object" winging around over north Korea. And a Sunday supplement magazine carried a story about a man who was burned by a saucer.

And now after a winter-time hiatus, the saucer season is with us again in Eugene.

The Greyhound Bus Depot, which normally echoes to pedestrian recitals of bus departures to such places as Canby and Aurora, Tuesday was abuzz with saucer talk.

Employees said the objects were first sighted by "two fellows from the service station across the street." But by 2:30 p.m., at least three of the coffee shop waitresses had seen the things and a group of cabbies were earnestly courting stiff necks trying to sight them.

"They looked like little diamonds," observed a waitress, Mrs. Charles Williams of Eugene. "They were dipping and diving way up, real high."

"Looked like about a hundred," said Miss Carol Wilkenson, 11th and Mill. "They seemed to turn on and off like Christmas tree lights. It's kind of shocking; I've read about them but . . ."

Mrs. Ruth Lancaster, Glenwood, was probably the first of the coffee shop crew to sight the objects. She called Miss Wilkenson to verify that she was not "seeing things."

The girls beguiled bus driver John Noel, Medford, into looking for the eerie objects. "Didn't see any," he said, rubbing his eyes and replacing his dark glasses. "Always wanted to, but I guess it's just like fishing, it's always the other fellow."

Those at the Greyhound terminal had number(both witnesses and saucers) on their side. But W. I. Lydston of 1775 W. Broadway, made the first sighting.

At 12:45 a.m. Tuesday, he told police, he saw a "large, blue-green light the size of a basketball" moving fast northeast of Eugene.

Red Planes Drop Flares on Inchon

Communist Ground Attack Beaten

SEOUL (AP)— Three to five Communist planes circled over the big Allied west coast port of Inchon and Kimpo Airfield, both near Seoul, Sunday night and dropped flares — but no bombs — on the eve of the exchange of disabled war prisoners.

U. S. airmen also reported seeing a strange "delta-shaped object" about 7 feet wide flying at 60 to 80 miles an hour over Red lines on the Western Front.

"The Communists sure have been acting crazy ever since this prisoner business started," said an American front-line officer when informed of the Red air activity at Inchon.

Hurl Back Attack

Aground, U. S. 3rd and 7th Division troops and Belgian infantrymen hurled back a Red attack by 750 Chinese northwest of Kumhwa on the Central Front. The Reds struck behind a 20-minute artillery barrage.

The Eighth Army said 100 Chinese were killed or wounded in the 70-minute engagement.

Elsewhere along the front, contacts stepped up. South Korean raiders on the Far Eastern end of the 155-mile battle line killed or wounded 51 North Koreans south of Anchor Hill.

Reds also probed lightly at Outpost Texas, east of the Pukhan River, and on Sniper Ridge on the Central Front, but were quickly scattered.

Planes Drop Flares

The 5th Air Force said three to five slow moving enemy planes — probably the same "bed check Charlies" which harrassed UN troops in 1951 and early 1952 — dropped a number of flares on Inchon and Kimpo.

Two trained aerial observers and two pilots flying routine reconnaissance missions in the Pork Chop-Old Baldy Hill sector of the western front reported to Army intelligence officers that they saw a "white, rounded, delta-shaped object" 5 to 7 feet in diameter flying with a vibrating motion just north of the two hills.
