m. Remarks: Objects appeared to be stars from casual observance, however paints on FPS-6 radar HRI. In same area indicate objects of some other nature. Fighter aircraft under my control reported visual contact, but no radar contact. They said that the Objects appeared to be stars, but I do not agree. When fighter aircraft got within 50 miles of the objects, both fighter's IFF disappeared from PPI of FPS-3 radar. The fighter aircraft IFF did not reappear until the fighters were approximately 70 miles from the Objects. During this time, there were other IFF paints on the PPI in other areas. It was assumed that the IFF equipment of the fighter aircraft was operational.

Was it the jets actually showing objects over ground?
