One object was observed from the ground at 1845 on 5 June 1952 by S/Sgt T.H. Shorey of 4925th Test Group (Atomic), Kirtland Air Force Base, New Nextco at his home, at 521 South Codar Street, Albuquerque, New Mexico. This address is approximately in the center of the city. The object was round in shape, but of indeterminable size. It had a very shiny luster but neither made noise nor left a trail. Its speed was described by the observer as approximately five or six times that of the F-86. It was first sighted at an angle of 80° to the observer on its north course which involved no apparent maneuvers or change of altitude. The object was observed for approximately six seconds in which time it covered the remaining distance across the horizon. The object crossed above a B-29 or B-50 which was flying on an easterly course at approximately 10,000 feet. It was believed by the observer that the object was at a much greater altitude than the bomber. There were no clouds with 60-mile visibility and easterly winds aloft of 20 MPH. S/Sgt Shorey's duty in the 4925th Test Group (Atomic) is in the engineering field. His observations from the mechanical viewpoint should be credited as fairly reliable. He has had experience in judging altidudes and speeds by observing F-86's in flight with knowledge of their speed and altitude.
