One (1) unidentified flying object was observed over Lubbock, Texas on 2 August 1952 from 0857 hours to 0903 hours. Sighting was by Mr. Gibbons, Mr. Sutton, Mr. Bass, Mr. Hobbs, Mr. Gossen, all of Lubbock, Texas.

SUBJECT: FLIGHT REPORT

SOURCE: Information contained in this report was obtained from Mr. Sam Gibbs, 2013 36th Street, Lubbock, Texas. Interview was conducted by Lieutenant John E. Maxwells, acting Wing Intelligence Officer.

1. On 2 August 1952 from 0857 hours to 0903 hours, one (1) unidentified flying object was sighted. The object sighted was spherical in shape with no apparent tail surfaces or exhaust. Source estimated the size of object to be approximately twenty-four (24) inches in diameter. The color of object was metallic.
2. The object when sighted was hanging in mid air. The only movement was a quivering motion. Mr. Gibbs watched object for six (6) minutes and object moved straight East till it disappeared into a cloud bank. He timed object from the time object started to move till it disappeared and it took sixteen (16) seconds. Object flew straight and level flight. There was no sound connected with said object.
3. Object was viewed with the naked eye. No optical or electronic equipment used.
4. Observation took place at 33343 10243N in the city of Lubbock, Texas. Object appeared approximately five (5) miles due East point of observation at approximately 10,000 feet.
5. Information concerning the reliability and experience of the observer is rather limited. Mr. Gibbs is very familiar with weather balloons and he is positive that subject object was not a balloon of any type. A check with Reeves AFB Operations revealed that there were B-25 type aircraft in the general area at time of sighting. Also a check was made at Municipal Airport and there were L-5 type aircraft in area at time of sighting.
6. The weather conditions at 0857 hours on 2 August 1952 were: temperature 78.1 degrees, visibility 15 miles with scattered clouds at 30,000 feet.
7. There were no known meteorological activity or condition to which this sighting could be attributed.
8. Physical evidence such as fragments, photographs, etc. were nonexistent.
9. There were no interception or identification action taken.
10. Aircraft from Reeves AFB and Municipal Airport of Lubbock were known to be in general area at time of sighting.

Comments of Preparing and Approving Officer:

Mr. Gibbs is well educated and highly intelligent individual. He was very sincere in his efforts to cooperate and assist this organization.
