At the request of Major , I would like to confirm the existence of two USAF documents which were recently denied by an official USAF representative. These are:

- 1. An intelligence summary on UFOs prepared in 1948 by the organization which later became the Air Technical Intelligence Center at Wright-Fatterson AFB.
- 2. An intelligence analysis on specific aspects of UFO data which I prepared in 1952 while acting as UFO program monitor for Headquarters USAF, Washington, D.C.

Since both documents were classified when I last saw them, I am not at liberty to reveal their contents. I would also like to add a qualification about #2: I completed it in rough form just andew hours before my departure from Washington (following my release from active duty) and turned it over to one of my associates in the Directorate of Intelligence. Therefore, I never saw it in its published form. However, since I had prepared it - as well as other reports which I recorded on tape - at the specific request of my Branch and Division Chiefs, I am certain that it was published.

Another word of caution is necessary on the latter document: I prepared it primarily as a weapon for use against the apathy and/or bias on the subject which prevailed in certain official quarters. Although the processes of logic employed would stand up under ordinary circumstances, they become somewhat tenuous and difficult to defend completely when applies to the task in question. The important point amould be, therefore, at such a document did exist - not that it did or did not establish anything about UPOs.

There is also a question about the report prepared by the panel of civilian scientists convened in January 1953 to examine the UFO data. I met with this panel during part of its deliberations; this was during the week when I was being processed off active duty. Since I had departed by the time the panel adjourned, I did not see any report which it may have prepared. However, since it was convened for the specific purpose of reviewing all available data and making recommendations on the UFO program, it must necessarily have left some sort of report, undoubtedly written. (I have since been informed that it did, although let me repeat that I never saw it.)

End my resollection is that the one wain't expecially think, maybe 25 or 30 pages.

Re your last question: Have I ever written on OFOs in unjublished form? The answer is a firm "no", neither published nor unjublished. 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With regard to Mr. Fournet, I told you that I had talked with the gentleman responsible for the analyses performed on the Utah and Montana films. The gentleman's name is Mr. Harry Wing Woo, formerly with the Navy's Photo Intelligence Center and the Central Intelligence Agency. He has since retired.

Mr. Woo was contacted by the Naval Intelligence Command in my behalf and was asked if he would contact me regarding the matter of his analysis. He phoned me and we talked about his analysis and other matters relating to UFOs. During our conversation I asked him if he had ever seen the ATIC 1948 Estimate of the Situation. He told me that then Major Fournet had showed it to him.

Major Fournet, so said Mr. Woo, was less than pleased with the way in which the Air Porce was conducting their investigations. At least he didn't seem to be satisfied with the conclusions reached. Neither, apparently, was the Navy. Mr. Woo told me that the Navy had seriously considered starting their own investigation into UFOs but didn't for the lack of nationwide facilities equal to those of the Air Force.

Mr. Woo stated that he had also been invited to a secret Pentagon briefing where a gun camera film shot by an Air Force pilot had been shown. (It is interesting to note that Mr. Woo thought that all this information was still classified and was somewhat reluctant to speak about it. I did, however, tell him that the CIA had declassified the Robertson Panel report and that all documentation was supposed to have been declassified.)

By now you have received the copies of correspondence I have received over the past year or so, and have had time to review the contents. As you will notice, a copy of JANAP 146 (E) was to be supplied to me. I have finally received that copy.

I notice that the copy of JANAP 146 your Center is selling consists of only six pages. I was wondering if this is because your Center thought it better to limit the number of pages, or because you did not have a full copy of this publication. In case you don't have a full copy, I must tell you that the information contained in the pages not offered by your Center are much more interesting than those you include. JANAP 146 contains a detailed list of information to be reported—information which could only apply to UFOs.

If your Center hasn't obtained the full copy, please let me know and I will send you one.

Regarding the "Estimate of the Situation." My requests have failed to surface a copy of this document. However, I am positive that it did exist. Additional substantiation of its existence was provided by a Mr. Harry Woo. Mr. Woo was the photo-analyst to whom then Major Dewey Fournet took the Utah and Montana films within the Navy's Photo Intelligence Center. Mr. Woo, in a telephone conversation with me, confirmed the fact that he was shown a copy of the "Estimate" by Major Fournet. Since Mr. Woo did not work for PIC until at least 1952, the Estimate survived long after it was supposedly ordered destroyed. (Mr. Woo, by the way, went to work for the CIA sometime around 1955—as a photo-analyst. He said he did not perform analysis on any UFO photographic materials for CIA.)

Mr. Woo also informed me that he had been invited to a special Pentagon briefing where a gun-camera film of a UFO was shown. He stated that the film was of poor quality and

showed only a blurred image. Even more interesting, however, was his reluctance to discuss the subject of UFOs. He seemed to feel that all this information was still highly secret. He was particularly reluctant to discuss his participation as a "witness" before the Robertson panel.

Mr. Woo also informed me that the Navy had seriously considered starting their own UFO investigating program. He said they didn't because of a lack of facilities.

Because I do not know if Mr. Woo would mind having his name mentioned, I have classified this letter "Confidential."

Regarding the matters of Major Fournet and Mr. Woo. I noticed that Mr. Dewey Fournet was slated to be a guest at the Ft. Smith, AR, UFO conference. I assume you would be able to get in touch with Mr. Fournet and confirm this information on your own--if you are not aware of it already.

If you would, please contact Mr. Fournet and ask him where he last saw a copy of the "Estimate" and what date it was. This may give me some clue as to where it is now. Also, if possible, ask him if there was any information contained in the Project Blue Book files on the CIA. It might also be interesting to know if the administrative and policy papers of Blue Book were as few when he was associated with the Project as they seem to be now. Masses of correspondence are missing. This, as I'm sure you know, is particularly true of the Project Sign and Grudge records.

I would also like to know if the "source" you alluded to in your letter of November 22, 1975, can obtain classified Air Force Intelligence documents. If so, I have a suggestion.

I am still working on obtaining CIRVIS and MERINT reports. My requests are very much up in the air--no pun intended--at the present moment. Could your Center benefit from photographic materials submitted along with CIRVIS reports? (What a stupid question!) I don't think there would be any way around paying for material of this type, source or no source.

I do not know how extensive your Center's files are. Do you have any information on a sighting at Luke AFB, Arizona, where gun-camera film footage was taken? (It occurred in March of 1953.) Also, do you have any information on a sighting at Osceola, Wisconsin, in July 1952? Film was also taken in this case.

I really would appreciate your cooperation on the matters to be asked of Mr. Fournet. I've tried to obtain his address from the Air Force, but the Air Force is slightly less than cooperative. As a matter of fact, in response to my request the Air Force used the word "alleged" while referring to his association with Blue Book. A fact I'm sure Mr. Fournet would find humor in.

Dear Mr. Hennessey:

This replies to your letter requesting information on certain documents pertaining to unidentified flying objects (UFOs). At present, I do not have any information to send you on the September 23, 1947 letter about which you inquired.

Regarding the 1948 "Estimate of the Situation," the late Captain Ruppelt in his book, The Report on Unidentified Flying Objects, provides the answer. The Top Secret Estimation was working its way up to the higher echelons of the Air Force. It got to the late General Hoyt S. Vanderberg, then Chief of Staff, before it was "batted down." The General wouldn't buy" interplanetary vehicles. The report lacked proof and the Estimate died a quick death. Some months later, it was completely declassified and relegated to the incinerator. I am sorry, but we have no copies of this document.

I have attached two more copies of the 1953 Panel's conclusions; I am sorry that our copies are of such poor quality. Regarding a photostat of the original signatures, I can only repeat what I stated in my February 23 letter, since this was not an Air Force report, we do not have a photostat of the Panel's original conclusions bearing their signatures.
