'Flying Saucers' Are Back Again

Michigan City, Ind., April 28 (AP) — A Michigan City radio "ham" said today an aviator flying over this city had reported sighting a "flying saucer" while in flight.

The radio "ham," Floyd Zerber, told a newsman that the aviator identified himself as Leon A. Faber, a Sandwich, Ill., business man and had said he was flying from Peoria, Ill., to Lansing, Mich.

Zerber said it was a one-way conversation as he was unable to talk back with the flier. Two other "hams" were also in on the conversation, Zerber said, but he was unable to identify them.

He quoted the flier as saying he sighted the "saucer" at an altitude of 3,000 feet. Zerber said Faber described the object as "a big aluminum disc," and remarked that "it couldn't be a weather balloon as it is traveling against the wind."

PILOT BELIEVES HE SAW FLYING SAUCER

SANDWICH, Ill., April 29.—(AP) —Businessman-Pilot Leon Faber is "just amazed" by the mysterious object he said he saw yesterday.

Faber said he spotted "a bright, shining object moving east" while flying over the Gary-Michigan City, Ind., area.

"It looked like one of those flying saucers," he said. "Certainly it was something I've never seen before."

Faber said he was flying at 6,000 feet and the object, 10,000 feet away, looked about the size of a basketball.

"It was on its flat side and just disappeared suddenly," he said. "It didn't get any smaller, like something moving away from you at a distance. It just suddenly disappeared. Goodness, it's the most stunning and amazing thing that ever happened to me. I didn't think it was possible."

Faber, 49, is president of the James Knights Company, manufacturers of radio crystals. He said he was talking by radio to some radio hams when he spotted the object and described it to them for the five minutes the object remained in his view.

Pilot Quoted As Seeing Disc Over State Prison Area

MICHIGAN CITY -- (UP) — A "ham" radio operator reported that the pilot of a private plane said he saw a "flying disc" sailing over this city Thursday.

The radio operator, Floyd Zerber of Michigan City, said he was listening to a radio conversation between a pilot who identified himself as Leon A. Faber, Sandwich, Ill., and amateurs on the ground in this area.

"Hey, there's one of those flying discs," Zerber said Faber exclaimed. He said that Faber reported he was flying 145 miles per hour at an altitude of 3,000 feet over the Indiana state prison on a flight from Peoria, Ill., to Lansing, Mich.

"Wait a minute, what have you been drinking," Faber was asked, according to Zerber.

"I'm serious," he said Faber replied. "It looks like a big aluminum disc and it's spinning very fast. It can't be a weather balloon because it's headed east against the wind and it's moving too fast."

'Flying Saucer' Sighted Over Gary By Incredulous Businessman-Flyer

SANDWICH, Ill., April 28.—
(AP)—Leon A. Faber, business
man-pilot, tonight said he had
seen a "flying saucer."

"It doesn't seem possible that
this could have happened to me.
But it did," he said.

"I was flying over the Gary-
Michigan City area when I saw
this object in the sky far above
me. It was amazing, just amaz-
ing. What it was, goodness
knows, but I've never seen any-
thing like it. It was stunning,"
Faber said.

HE DESCRIBED the object as
"very bright, like sun shining on
steel or aluminum. It was mov-
ing parallel to the ground—
that is, flat instead of on end—
and was traveling east.

"At my altitude, 6,000 feet,
the wind was from the east. I'd
say this object was at about

16,000 feet, and up there the
wind probably was from the
west, so it doesn't necessarily
mean it was traveling against
the wind."

From that distance, he said,
the object appeared "about the
size of a basketball."

"I was talking to some radio
hams when I first spotted this
object. It was a very clear day,
not a cloud in the blue sky, and
I was able to keep sight of it for
at least five minutes.

"IT DIDN'T become smaller as
it went out of sight. It just
seemed that very suddenly it
wasn't there any longer. I can't
explain it, but it's the most
amazing thing that ever hap-

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peared there was no flash or
smoke or trail that it left.

"Goodness, before this hap-
pened I always had suspicions
about those flying saucer re-
ports. You know, you kind of
believe maybe someone is un-
balanced. I certainly never
thought the same thing would
happen to me."

He sighted the object, he said,
at about 8 A. M., Central Stand-
ard Time.

Faber, who is 49 years old,
said he has been flying for more
than two and one-half years and
has 800 hours to his credit. He
is president of the James
Knights Company of Sandwich,
manufacturers of crystals for
radios.

Report Flying Disc Over State Prison

Indiana was reported today by a
"ham" radio operator who said he
heard an airplane pilot describe it.

Floyd Zerber, Michigan City, the
radio operator, said he was listen-
ing to a radio conversation between
a pilot and amateurs on the ground
in this area.

"Hey, there's one of those fly-
ing discs," the pilot, who identified

himself as Leon A. Faber, Sand-
wich, Ill., exclaimed.

Zerber said Faber reported he
was flying 145 miles per hour at an
altitude of 3,000 feet over the In-

Sandwich, April 29. — Leon A. Faber, president of the James Knights Company of Sandwich, said yesterday that he had seen a "flying saucer."

Hardly believing that it happened he reported, "I was flying over the Gary (Ind.)-Michigan City area when I saw this object in the sky far above me. It was amazing, just amazing. What it was, goodness knows, but I've never seen anything like it."

His description of the object was that it was "very bright, like sun shining on steel or aluminum." It was moving parallel to the ground, that is, flat instead of on end, and was travelling east.

"At my altitude, 600 feet, the wind was from the east. I'd say this object was at about 16,000 feet, and up there the wind probably was from the west, so it doesn't necessarily mean it was travelling against the wind."

He said the object appeared to be "about the size of a basketball" from that distance. It was a bright clear day and he was able to watch it for at least five minutes.

"It didn't become smaller and smaller as it went out of sight. It just seemed that very suddenly it wasn't there any longer. I can't explain it, but it's the most amazing thing that ever happened to me. When it disappeared there was no flash or smoke or trail that it left."

He sighted the object, he said, at about 8 o'clock in the morning, sat.
