I use to described the basic level of our MADAR work as being unmanned sensor sites or robot stations. I'm reminded of the Mar's landers and ground probes, and lunar surveyors. The better way to get a handle on our MADAR concept and to give more credit where credit is due, is to call them participation levels.

A Level-I operation is the most common where interested parties buy a MADAR unit and place it online to gather data. These MADAR Project members don't have the equipment or the funds to buy them or the ability to respond to an alert, but they want the sensors to be there if a UAP is in the region. Sixty-six percent of our MADAR system are in Level-I and we are absolutely thrilled to have them. They get emails when an anomaly occurs so this is rewarding in that sense, and of course we get the email documentation as well.

A Level-II operation is the next step up and quite a jump at that. Somebody who wants to be alerted when a UAP flies over and wants to get as much scientific data as they can, and be able to go outside and look, usually purchases a DAS or Delayed Alarm System or has SMS (short message service) sent to their cell phones. I say usually when I mentioned the DAS because although it is the fastest way to get an alert, a MADAR site can qualify as a Level-II if the operator or someone he designates within 5-10 miles gets the SMS (short message system) on their cells. A good example of a Level-II without a DAS is the Norris City, Illinois site 115. The operator works for a company out of his home and doesn't want an alarm system or DAS. A few miles away, however, his son gets the SMS alerts and both men have elaborate equipment kits. The latter lives at a good observation site. If anything would show up on his night vision, geiger counter, or spectrum analyzer, he would immediately contact the MADAR site op by phone.

If anyone wants to upgrade to a Level-II, all they have to do is add a DAS (about \$20) and/or the SMS, or find somebody nearby who wants to "slide down the pole" when the action starts. That's something I wouldn't pass up. And to see recommended equipment we have established a PLL which can be viewed at:
